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THE TEEN IDOLS OF THE 1970s

hailed from all over the place: big cities

(L.A.'s Bobby Sherman), small towns (Ogden, Utah's Osmonds) even other countries (England's Peter Frampton). Some of them. like the Brady Kids, came straight from the TVI But whatever their hometown, they all had one thing

in common: that magical chemistry that made them utterly irresistible to young audiences across the country.

Bobby Sherman's hit Easy Come, Easy Go. sums up this teen idol's good-natured attitude toward a show-business life that's seen him go up, down and back up a few times. Unable to make it as a singer during his regular stint on the mid-'60s teen-music TV show Shindig, Bobby tried his luck with acting. After landing a role on the series Here Come the Brides, he became enough of a star to

secure a new recording contract, and by 1969, his singles were regularly making the

top 10. The hits stopped coming in '72, but easygoing Bobby has remained a popular TV and concert attraction ever since.

Another act that had to wait a while between TV exposure and a successful recording career

was the Osmonds. Alan, Merrill, Wayne and Jay made their debut on Andy Williams' variety show in 1962

(Donny joined the group a year later at age six). They didn't get their first hit, though, until 1971, when One Bad Apple zoomed to the top of the charts and established



the guintet as teen favorites. That fall, Donny scored a No. 1 hit on his own with a remake

of Steve Lawrence's 1963 smash,

Go Away Little Girl.

Success came much faster to another musical family, known as the Jackson 5. The five brothers from Gary, Indiana—Tito, Jermaine, Jackie, Marlon and, of course, Michael—took the world by storm in 1970 with their debut single, I Want You Back, and its equally infectious follow-up, the schoolhouse-rocking ABC. By 1972, barely teenaged teen idol Michael

was already piling up solo hits as well, such as **Rockin' Robin** and **Ben**.

While their series was loosely based on the life of late-'60s musical family the Cowsills (of *Hair* fame), TV's fictional Partridge Family

ultimately eclipsed their real-life counterparts with a string of early-'70s hits, including

I Can Feel Your Heartbeat.

Most of the rapid heartbeats the Partridges caused were due to lead singer David Cassidy, who played Keith Partridge and was, in real life, the stepson of screen mom Shirley Jones.

David's half-

brother Shaun kept the Cassidy clan's teen-idol reputation alive right through the mid-1970s. Interestingly, this fresh-faced. all-American boy from L.A. found his first success abroad; European audiences embraced him well before he made it on his native soil. One of the songs that catapulted Shaun to that fame was 1977's That's Rock 'n' Roll—a tune penned by Eric Carmen. whose band the Raspberries had scored big with Go All the Way in 1972.



Another keeper of the family flame was Andy Gibb, who was born in 1958, the same year his older brothers Barry, Robin and Maurice a.k.a. the Bee

Gees—were beginning their illustrious careers. Andy was already doing well in his family's native Australia when he caught the disco fever his siblings had helped spread with their songs for the 1977 film Saturday Night Fever. With writing, vocal and production contributions from big brother Barry, I Just Want to Be Your Everything gave Andy his breakthrough U.S. hit.

The star of Saturday Night Fever was, of course, John Travolta, already a teen idol

from his role as Vinnie Barbarino, head Sweathog on the immensely popular TV sitcom *Welcome Back, Kotter.* While *Saturday Night Fever* showcased Travolta's dancing abilities, his success as a singer dates back to his *Kotter* days, when he registered heartmelting hits like 1976's **Let Her In**.

Bay City Rollers were unknown in the U.S.
until their **Saturday Night**, with its
irresistible chorus chant,
topped the charts in 1976.
The band got their name
when their manager stuck a
pin at random in a map of the

U.S. and landed on Bay City, Michigan.

It certainly was an interesting choice,
