wing much to the disco craze of the last half of the 1970s, the sounds of the '80s, at least in the early years of the decade, were often designed to get people out of their seats and onto the dance floor. No song fit the bill better than Kool and the Gang's Celebration. This salute to good times was the biggest hit ever for bass player Robert "Kool" Bell and his New Jersey gang—and it remains to this day a staple of just about any party band you can shake a noise-maker at.

Another staple of early '80s gettogethers was Olivia Newton-John's Physical. Tying in with the burgeoning fitness movement, the 1981 tune was heard at many an aerobics class, even as its suggestive lyrics caused some radio stations to ban the record. That was certainly a first for Newton-John, whose transformation from wholesome Australian-bred country-pop singer to Grease film and music star was completed by Physical's ability to generate body heat.

No doubt plenty of female fans would have loved getting a physical from Olivia's fellow Aussie, hunky Rick Springfield, who wasn't a real doctor but played one on TV on the popular daytime drama *General Hospital*. In reality, Springfield was a musical teen idol back in Australia well before he began acting and he put his rock roots to full use on the '81 chart topper Jessie's Girl.

With one foot in soul-tinged dance music and the other in melodic poprock, the team of Daryl Hall and John Oates achieved tremendous success in the 1980s. Raised in Philadelphia's suburbs, they were living in New York's

Greenwich Village and recording at the Jimi Hendrix-built Electric Lady Studios when Kiss on My List hit No. I in 1981. By decade's end they had topped another list: bestselling duo of all time.

While Lionel Richie had already authored such No. 1 hits as the Commodores'



Three Times a Lady and Kenny Rogers' Lady, it wasn't until the '81 smash Endless



Love, his duet with Diana Ross, that Richie finally decided to leave his colleagues in the Commodores to pursue a solo career. His self-titled debut album yielded Tauly, making '82 part of a string of nine consecutive years in which Richie authored at least one No. 1 chart hir.

England's David Bowie, on the other hand, waited nearly eight years between his first No. I single, 1975's Fame (coauthored by John Lennon), and his second, 1983's Let's Dance. The song was the biggest success of the chameleonlike Bowie's soul-pop period, aided in no small part by the work of coproducer Nile Rodgers (of Chic) and blues-rock guitar phenom Stevie Ray Vaughan.

It's often good business to connect a song with a movie, as was the case with Against

#### All Odds (Take a Look at Me Now).

Director Taylor Hackford knew he wanted Phil Collins to supply the theme for his 1984 romantic thriller starring Jeff Bridges and Rachel Ward. Hackford tracked down Collins, who was on the road with his band, Genesis. After a private screening of the film, Collins agreed—and both a hit song and a hit film resulted.

Another mid-'80s marriage of vinyl and celluloid was Dow't You (Forger about ME), written by Keith Forsey for director John Hughes' 1985 high school flick, The Breakfast Club. British new-wavers Simple Minds weren't Forsey's first choice (he wanted suave English crooner Bryan Ferry), but vocalist Jim Kerr and company did a good job with the bittersweet ballad—good enough for

her close-cropped red-orange hair and businessman's attire, Eurythmics vocalist Annie Lennox made quite an impression in the video for SWEET DREAMS (ARE MADE of This), her first 1983 hit with partner Dave Stewart.

The next year saw the solo debut of another visually distinctive artist, Cyndi Lauper. As her thrift-store fashions and full-throttled vocals demonstrated, Queens native Lauper was both eccentric and talented. The touching Time Afren Time was one of four top-five hits spawned by the aptly titled She's So Unusual, which also included the anthemic Girls Just Want to Have Fun.

Speaking of fun, plenty of it was generated in the mid-'80s by two all-female rock groups: the power-popping Bangles and the punky, new wave Go-Gos. Highlighted by '60s-style group harmonies and the jangly electric guitars of Susanna Hoffs and Vicki Peterson, the Bangles' infectious Walk Like AN Eqyptian was Billboard's top ranking single of 1987. That same year, former Go-Gos lead singer Belinda Carlisle registered her first solo hit with the uplifting romantic ballad Heaven Is a Place on Earth.

One of the backup vocalists on Carlisle's recording was up-and-coming songwriter Diane Warren, who that same year coauthored Norhing's Gonna Stop Us Now, the first of a cartful of No. 1 hits for the tunesmith. Recorded by Starship, which had evolved from the original Jefferson Airplane, the song sported the unmistakable vocals of '60s-generation San Francisco fun girl Grace Slick.

Like Slick's, the career of England's Steve Winwood dated back to the swinging '60s. As a teenager, he sang lead for the Spencer Davis Group on such high-powered hits as I'm a Man and Gimme Some Lovin'. Twenty years later, the former lead singer of Traffic finally racked up his first-ever No. 1 hit with Higher Love, featuring vocals by the inimitable Chaka Kahn.

The mid-'70s brainchild of guitarist and MIT graduate Tom Scholz, Boston recorded most of its material in the basement studio of its engineering-whiz leader. Propelled by Scholz's trademark double-tracked leads and Brad Delp's ever-climbing vocals, Amanda was instrumental to the band's triumphant comeback in 1986.

Songs can make comebacks, too. Take Red Red Wine, written and originally recorded by Neil Diamond in 1968. Reggae artist Tony Tribe covered the tune in 1969, and it was his Jamaicaspiced arrangement that was the basis for UB40's version, recorded in 1983. That rendition immediately topped the British charts, but it wasn't until an Arizona DJ resurrected the track in 1988 and began a new round of airplay that Red Red Wine finally made it to No. 1 in the U.S. On the other hand, singer Trevor Steel and

the rest of London's Escape Club saw their single Wild, Wild WEST gallop to the top of the charts in the U.S. in



By the latter part of the '80s, the emergence of hip-hop and technorock was helping to



forge a far different kind of dance music than was heard earlier in the decade. Feet were still moving across the floor, but with a darker, edgier energy—just the kind that Australian sextet INXS specialized in. Led by heartthrob lead vocalist Michael Hutchence, the group made sexy, skirtish music, exemplified by their '87 smash Need You Tonight.

Another INXS hit was titled New Sensation, a term that just about sums up the sounds of the '80s.
